- Start marshalling to make things easy we'll ask you to turn one bank at a time. This
 allows more room for turning when you move off your marshalling position to row to the
 start line.

Competitors engaging in unsportsmanlike behaviour (which includes foul or obscene language in the public hearing) will be subject to disciplinary measures up to and including disqualification.


1.4 Accident & Emergency

1.6 Registration

Registration for **all competitors** is in the main Royal Chester Rowing Club's clubhouse. You should aim to register no later than 30 minutes before your assigned boating time.

To minimise queues one representative from each club should register with the entries secretary, confirm any substitutions with evidence of the associated British Rowing membership and collect their folder of race numbers. You will be given:

Empacher slot numbers.

We are using these to improve visibility for our Timing team (speeds up results!) and to reduce plastic waste – so please ensure your boat is properly equipped with a functional Empacher slot before you leave your club! Please attach these to your boat ensuring that they are firmly tethered to the boat. These should be returned when you disembark after racing. Buckets will be provided for this purpose.

Paper racing numbers

These should be securely pinned to the back of the sculler / crew member in the bow seat and the cox so that they are clearly visible during racing. Competitors with long hair should ensure it does not obscure their racing number.

1.7 Competitors' briefing

The main briefing will be provided as an online video, available through the event's website at www.royalchester.org

There is therefore no requirement for competitors to attend an in person briefing. However, competitors may be asked, prior to boating, to demonstrate that they have watched and understood the video.

Club representatives will be informed of any late updates on conditions or changes when they attend registration.

1.8 Alternative arrangements plan

In the days leading up to the event, the organising committee will monitor river conditions, stream, tide levels, presence of debris and weather forecasts for wind speeds, rain, high or low temperatures.

If the combination of conditions is such that the race needs to be cancelled then every effort will be made to make that decision by 12 noon on the Saturday immediately preceding the race. This is to help competitors and officials avoid having to make an unnecessary journey.

Please note that forecasts change meaning safety may demand a cancellation on the

day. Recent heavy rainfall may also have an impact on river levels on the day of the event.

Consideration will be given to rowing a shorter course and also restricting the race to more experienced and competent competitors if this would allow the race to go ahead safely.

Alternative arrangements will be communicated by race control on the day. Changes will be communicated to club representatives at the point of registration.

2.0 Safety & Welfare

2.1 General safety environment – also see Safety Plan and Risk assessment

The River Dee is generally a clean river however wildlife, including rats, live in and around the river which may transmit infectious diseases such as Weil's disease (symptoms include; high fever, headache, chills, muscle ache, vomiting, jaundice, red eyes and abdominal pains; any competitor exhibiting any symptoms should consult their doctor).

There are occasional discharges of sewage into the River Dee; if this occurs consideration will be given on whether it is necessary to cancel the event.

Competitors should not drink river water; should cover cuts and grazes with waterproof dressings and take care to wash their hands before eating.

Competitors with long hair should ensure it is tied up and unable to become trapped or entangled with their boat / equipment.

Coxes should wear an appropriate lifejacket on the outside i.e. worn as the last layer on top of all clothing.

Competitors should be suitably dressed including for the row to the start, a wait of up to 90 minutes at the start and racing. When considering what to wear please take into account conditions including sun, wind, rain, temperature, combined chill factor to hypothermia. Dry-robes and jeans should not be worn when afloat. Competitors deemed unsuitably dressed will not be allowed to boat and / or race.

Visiting crews are not permitted to practise outside the published boating times as safety boat cover will not be in place.

The river is not closed to other users. Commercial pleasure craft (tourist boats) will be operating and other rivers users e.g. paddle boarders, canoeists may also be afloat. Other rivers users may be unaware that a race is taking place and not know the navigation rules. Competitors should keep a good look out and take action to avoid a collision.



2.2 Medical / Emergencies

There are three ambulance accessible emergency evacuation points at Eccleston, Sandy Lane and the Groves. Details are provided on a map which is displayed on the Royal Chester Rowing Club website www.royalchester.org

St John's Ambulance will be stationed at the Royal Chester Rowing Club's Clubhouse and will provide cover for The Groves and Queen's Park areas.

The nearest Accident and Emergency Department is at The Countess of Chester Hospital, Liverpool Road, Chester, CH2 1UL.

2.3 Welfare Policy

The Event Committee follow the process identified in British Rowing's Safeguarding Handbook 3, Section 7.2 (available at RCRC website)

Participating clubs are responsible to ensure all children are under the supervision of a nominated parent or club representative.

3.0 The Race

3.1 Embarkation (Boating)

The Draw will include details of the allocated boating location for each club and times to per boat.

Competitors boating in the Groves / Hickory's area will use landing stages near the Bandstand.

NOTE – we will deploy a 3rd landing stage just downstream of the Bandstand – this is primarily for embarkation and and may only be used for disembarkation by singles and doubles due to the adjacent moorings

If necessary, some competitors may be directed by marshals to use the landing stage at Grosvenor Rowing Club (about 100 metres upstream).

Boating will start once all of the safety boats are in place on the river.

Competitors must boat at their allocated times. We want everyone to have an enjoyable race with minimum wait, so please respond positively to calls from our volunteers to boat. Blades should be brought to the boating stage in advance.

Anyone attempting to boat late may be refused permission to proceed to the start

Competitors are responsible for checking their boat complies with Rowsafe guidance. Competitors may be asked at Control Commission to confirm what checks they have made. Random checks of boats will also take place using the British Rowing control commission checklist and boats not complying will not be allowed to race.

To prevent misrepresentation, random roll calls will be carried out at boating. Crews who do not match the entries on BROE will not be allowed to race without first making required substitutions as allowed by British Rowing rules of racing.

3.2 Proceeding to the start

Competitors must obey instructions from the marshals and umpires including on the way up to start.

Competitors should proceed to the start on the Meadows side of the river i.e. should keep to the sculler's left / cox's right. Boats may overtake on the way up to the start, using the centre of the river

The river will not be closed to other craft. The river Dee is visited by a range of users including paddle boarders, canoeists and motor boats. Every effort has been made to inform and gain consent of other river users that a race is taking place. However, competitors may still encounter river users who may be unaware of the race and/or rules of the river. Competitors must keep a good lookout and take action to avoid collisions.

No crew should paddle back down the course. The exception is equipment failure or medical emergency where competitors must follow instructions given by marshals.

There are two cut off points when proceeding to the start: The cut off to the Red House, about 3.5 km from the start, is 25 minutes before division start time. The cut off to the Road Bridge, about 1.2 km from the start, is 15 minutes before start time.

Crews who do not reach the cut off points in time may be turned back to ensure a division is not delayed.

3.3 Start Marshalling


Competitors will marshal above the start at Eccleston Ferry. Crews should allow a minimum of 40 minutes to reach the start, longer if the stream is strong and/or the crew is less experienced.

Crews arriving at the start less than 5 minutes before the division start time may be required to race from the back of the division.

Competitors must paddle light and with care as they approach and row through the marshalling area at Eccleston Ferry.

Competitors should proceed beyond the start to their marshalling point (as indicated on the bank markers) keeping their bows pointing upstream and position themselves in numerical order (the lowest numbered crew should be nearest the start line).





3.4 The Start

Competitors must obey the instructions of the Start Marshall at all times. Crews should not turn until instructed to do so. There will be start marshals both on the riverbank and in launches. The start order has been designed to reduce overtaking by starting faster crews first and allowing gaps in the start order to prevent bunching.

When instructed to spin, boats should turn and paddle downstream keeping in numerical order and maintaining 3 to 4 lengths of clear water between them and the crew ahead. Competitors should be considerate when turning, allowing sufficient space to avoid collisions. Lower number crews have priority over higher crews when spinning.

Crews will be started by the command "Number ... Go".

Timing will commence as each boat passes the Start line which is located approximately 20mtrs downstream from the Start Umpire

3.5 During the Race

Crews should keep a good look out when racing. Although key water sport groups are aware of the race, there may be individual river users on the water who are unaware of the race (and potentially unaware of navigation rules). Commercial pleasure (tourist) craft may also be present on the course.

All crews must comply with umpires instructions, failure to do so may result in penalty or disqualification.

Boats being overtaken must give way in good time to allow faster boats to follow their proper racing course.

The start to Heron Bridge

The early sections of the race from Eccleston to the Road Bridge and Heron Bridge are narrower making overtaking more difficult. Marshals and umpires are stationed in these areas and will give instructions to crews if necessary to avoid a collision. Please respond promptly to steering warnings from marshals.

Red House to the finish


Once past the Red House pub, all crews must race on the Meadows side of the centreline of the river (i.e. cox's left /sculler's right. This is to avoid interaction with any commercial boats. There is agreement with Chester commercial boats that they will use the City / Huntington side of the river i.e. the opposite bank to the Meadows. There will be an Event Marshall stationed on these boats to advise the captain and to notify the Safety Officer/Chief Umpire of any incidents or near misses. This boat may be preceded by a pilot launch which will issue instructions to correct course if a collision is likely.

3.6 The Finish – Circulation and Disembarkation

The race finish is by the stone steps at the bottom of Dee Lane. There will be finish signs in place but no audible signals to competitors when crossing the finish. Once they have crossed the finish line competitors should switch to light pressure, but **must not stop** and instead continue paddling.

Immediately downstream of the finish there is a line of large orange buoys on the Royal Chester Clubhouse side of the river. Competitors must take care not to collide with these buoys and are advised to be in the middle of the river as they cross the finish line.

The **finish circulation pattern** to be followed by all competitors is given below.



After the finish, boats must continue on The Meadows (cox's left / scullers right) side of the river towards the Suspension bridge. Marshals in launches will instruct crews.

Hazard warning

There is a large weir just beyond the Suspension bridge. The weir is clearly marked by large yellow warning signs. Crews are advised not to paddle past the bandstand towards the weir.

Crews returning to the Groves

should spin shortly after the suspension bridge and paddle into the stages if it is clear to do so or if instructed by marshals. If the stage is full the crew should stay alert and ensure they maintain their position on the river and do not drift towards the weir.

Once at the stage crews should disembark swiftly and remove their boat ASAP.

Crews returning to Grosvenor (GRC), Kings School (KSRC), Royal Chester (RCRC) and Queen's Park (QPHS)

should spin at the buoy at the Suspension Bridge, and proceed back to their respective stages. QPHS returning crews must obtain the permission of a marshal before crossing the river.

3.7 Complaints and appeals

Complaints of interference must be registered with the chief umpire immediately after the race.

Appeals about timings must also be made to the chief umpire, immediately after publication of results. Time bonuses will not be awarded, but time penalties may be given.

The chief umpire may be contacted at Race Control located at the clubhouse, Royal Chester Rowing Club.

3.8 Spectators

We have become aware that Severn Trent Water will close the footpath as shown in the image below (a little inconvenient as this is the final 300m stretch before a nail-biting finish).

We believe this still allows access to the Easterly barriered area but, if spectators wish to go further upstream, they should revert to the Blue diversion. Sorry for any inconvenience



4.0 Results and Prizegiving

4.1 Results

Provisional results will be available at Royal Chester Rowing Club as soon as possible. Results will also be displayed at Queen's Park High School Rowing Club.

Results will be posted at www.royalchester.org within 24 hours of the race.

4.2 Prize Giving

Presentation of prizes will be at Royal Chester Rowing Club, presided over by our invited VIP guests from Civic and/or Athletic backgrounds

Please approach Royals via Dee Lane and avoid cutting through Kings School

Morning division prizegiving – assemble from 12:20 pm

Afternoon division prizegiving – assemble from 4:50 pm

Winners should present their British Rowing racing licence to race control at RCRC clubhouse to receive a ticket to be awarded with prizes. Competitors who are unable to or do not wish to attend the presentation may collect their prize from race control.

Please note medals will not be forwarded by post after the event.

Presentations may involve photographs being taken. If you do not wish to be photographed, please inform us in advance.

Prize giving will be visible / audible to those at QPHS but for prize winners (only), we will offer a 'ferry' service to save your legs!

5.0 Arrival and Parking

You'll be notified of your assigned boating location in the draw.

Boating locations have been assigned to ensure enough capacity at each location. Please do not change to a different boating location without first obtaining agreement from the event organisers.



5.1 Approaching the City

Please approach Chester via the M56 (see note below) / M53 / A56 / A51 / A483 / A55 North Wales Expressway and use the relevant route below to reach the relevant parking area:

- Trailers & Cars dropping Off sculling boats: City side Boating Locations (Groves, Grosvenor, Kings, Royals) – enter via A41 / A51
- Trailers & Cars dropping off sculling boats at QPHS ONLY enter via A483 (or alternative shown)
- Pedestrians: enter via A483 or use Park and Ride AFTER 9:30 (afternoon division only!)

Note – Please check ahead for any roadworks / other traffic delays, especially in respect of ongoing works on the M56 westbound.



5.2 Approaching Boating Locations – also see diagram in 5.4

5.2.1 The Bandstand area – Dee Lane route (Trailers only)

Follow the Dee Lane approach, past The Groves and under the Suspension bridge. Park on the road (not pavement) in line from the café at the mini roundabout back to the suspension bridge. Towing vehicles may stay at the Groves, in line with trailers.

5.2.2 The Groves_Hickory's – Souters Lane route (Trailers and Cars dropping Off Sculling Boats)

Follow the Souters Lane approach. Approach past the Roman Amphitheatre and turn down Souters Lane just before the City Walls to the riverside by Hickory's Smokehouse restaurant. Follow Marshalls' instructions at the roundabout

Trailers should be reversed into the Handbridge end of the Groves. Towing vehicles should be distributed in line with Marshalls' guidance

Boats may be assembled along the Groves. However, plenty of space must be left for vehicles (inc emergency access) to pass through the Groves. Additional space by Hickory's restaurant is provided between Souters Lane and Lower Bridge Street. Please follow instructions from marshals when parking vehicles and assembling / moving boats.

We only have limited capacity for parking permits at the Groves so, if there is insufficient room for cars carrying sculling boats to park at the Groves, such vehicles should drop off at the Groves Hickorys end and position their car at one of QPHS or Roodee car parks (both about 5 minutes' walk, but QPHS is cheaper!)

5.2.3 Parking permits at the Groves - General

Important Note - Following discussions with our council, all tow vehicles parked at the Groves will be required to display a Parking Permit. Consequently, following the Draw and identification of your club's boating location, we will require Club representatives to submit their vehicle description and registration by Thursday 21 September to our Parking leader.

On arrival,

- For all AM vehicles arriving 6:30-9:30, you may collect a parking pass from the local parking volunteers
- Thereafter, and for PM only vehicles, please collect your parking pass from Race Control at Royals clubhouse

5.2.4 For trailers and cars carrying boats to Queens Park High School Rowing Club (QPHS)

Follow the A483 Wrexham Road, Overleigh Road then Queens' Park Road. You

should avoid cutting through the city as you will face delays/congestion. Trailer parking is provided onsite at QPHS.

5.3 Parking For Pedestrians (competitors inc after dropping off sculling boat), spectators, and Royal Chester members / volunteers

Please refer to the map in 5.4 below

Note -- Parking adjacent to Royal Chester Rowing Club's clubhouse is reserved for safety support, umpires and other race officials only. On race day there is no car parking at Royal Chester Rowing Club or on The Groves for competitors, spectators or club members – please do not attempt to park here – it will slow down proceedings if it takes a place of an umpire or medical team!
